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The Light in Our Eyes

Prison ministry has been an important part of my life since 1994, when I was invited by a friend to participate in a Kairos® weekend retreat. Kairos is an international prison ministry modeled after the Catholic and Episcopal Cursillo church renewal movements. At first, the idea was so foreign that I immediately rejected it, but after the first weekend event, I have remained totally committed to prison ministry.

One of the basic tenets of the Kairos® prison ministry is that regular, long term relationships are essential. There is little success in the prison ministry programs that visit only once or occasionally—it is those who are committed to the long term that succeed, because they focus on building mentoring

relationships between “freeworld” volunteers and prisoners. Without the return visits of the volunteers, many prisoners have difficulty in maintaining a strong commitment to spiritual growth.

One of the tools used in building these relationships is the reunion group meeting, where volunteers and prisoners meet regularly to discuss their “walk” with Christ, a term that has deep meaning among prisoners because of its relationship to the concept of “talking the talk and walking the walk”. That is, they must be willing to show their commitment by actually doing what they say they will do.

In a weekly reunion group meeting with a group of prisoners when we were discussing our walk with Christ during the previous week, I noticed a new face in our small group. At first I thought he had been transferred there from another facility and had been

We cannot justify delaying that call to someone who is searching for God. We dare not delay inviting that son or daughter, grandchild, neighbor, fellow worker or friend any longer. Now it the day of salvation. The morrow may not be ours, worse yet belong to those who need Christ today.

For years I delayed giving but the most meager of donations or tithing, always saying when I can, I'll do



it. When my income is large enough I'll be able to afford it, or have the time to work for good causes, etc.

Then about fifteen years ago God opened my eyes to the fact that I could not afford NOT to tithe. That my time belongs to Him. He's put me here for a purpose. We are called to serve Him as He directs and to do it cheerfully and with thanksgiving.

The past six months have been difficult for me and our church family: desertions, deceptions, betrayals, the works! But while men have failed as men are prone to do, God has not failed us, nor will He do so.

You see, we have fixed our anchor in the haven of hope, we are taking literally the Scriptural verse: "I will never leave or forsake you."

And even with all the problems and disappointments we have grown stronger as a church family and one learning to persevere.

The three of the Continuing Church: ACC, APCK and UECNA are the only real examples of the real Anglican Spirit in our world.

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seeking a reunion group to join. I learned a little later, when he had the opportunity to share his past week's story, that he had been invited by one of the regular group members.

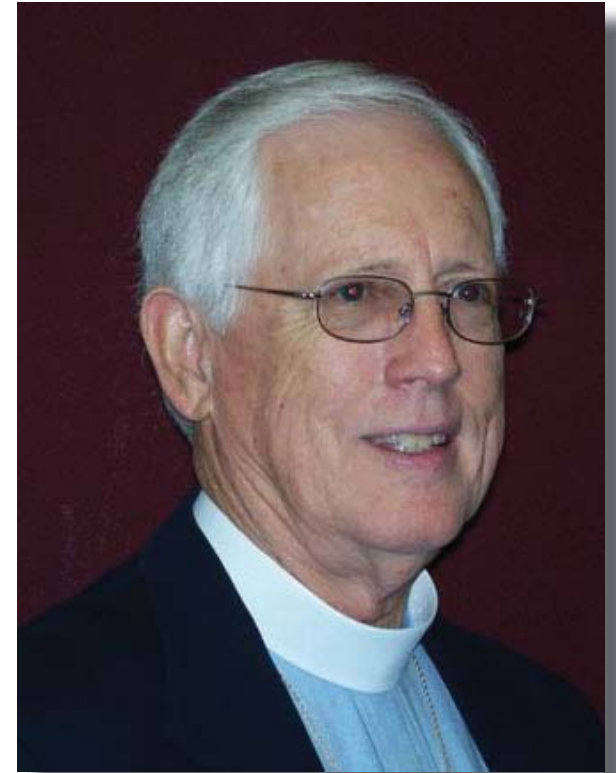
He was indeed new to the facility, and it turned out he was new to the reunion group concept as well. He admitted that before he was incarcerated, he had been a devil worshipper. He went on to say that he had been raised by his grandmother, whom he loved, and he knew it broke her heart when he was arrested and incarcerated. He wanted to please her, and he knew she was an active Christian, so he began writing in his letters to her that he had turned to Christ even though he had not actually done so. He knew this made her happy, and he was glad for that, so he continued his charade confident he would never be found out.

That is, until one day when he received a letter from her that read, "I've found a ride, and I'm coming to visit!" Of course, she thought he would be very happy, and in a way, he said, he was. But there was one thing that worried him—he knew that when she saw him, she would know he had been lying about his faith. I asked him, "Why would you think that?" He answered, "Because I knew she wouldn't see the light." Puzzled, I inquired, "What light?" He replied, "You know, the light that all Christians have in their eyes." There was a brief, palpable silence as the group pondered his comment, humbled at its deep meaning.

You see, as Christians, we take a lot for granted, and much

of that is good. We take for granted Jesus' promise that he will be present when two or more are gathered in his name; we take for granted that real Christian love is agapé love, the shared kind, where we care for each other; we take for granted that the joy we experience is real, wholesome, and pure, a true gift of God; and we take for granted that all Christians share these blessings.

What we fail to remember is that there are those who see them and want them and do not know how to find them,

As Christians, we are called to reach out to others, to invite them into our midst and let them share our joy. It is when they receive the Holy Spirit, the true baptism, that they begin their journey away from darkness and into the light. That simple lesson taught me to be open to everyone, to invite them to the feast, and those who long for the Lord will find that, after a short time, they too will have that light in their eyes. Look for the ones who have no light--they are the ones who are lost. And we are the candles that can ignite their flame.🕯

Our parish was delighted to play host to the Spring Convent investiture service of the Priory of St. Thomas a Becket, the North Carolina chapter of the

Military Order of Jerusalem, commonly known as the



Knights Templar. The meeting included in induction of three new members. After the service, the whole convent assembled in front of the Chapel dressed in their white robes and red crosses, except the Chaplain, who was dressed in clerical black with a white stole.

In January, we began using a locally-produced large-type version of the Book of Common Prayer. The 18-pt type format, on regular letter size paper, makes it easier for people with reading difficulties to follow the service, and also for people who are not familiar with Anglican worship to follow along and participate in the responses. The BCP includes the 1928 BCP text of Morning Prayer, Evening Prayer, Holy Eucharist, Litany and the Penitential Office for Ash Wednesday. It also includes the UECNA version of the 1549 Holy Eucharist service,

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as approved at the Synod in October 2008. Also included are other services we use on special occasions which are not specifically provided for in the 1928 BCP, such as Maundy Thursday, Easter Matins, Ascension and Transfiguration Day, Christmas Eve Matins/Vigil/Midnight Mass.

The parish received Courtney Fleenor as a Candidate in Holy Orders. Courtney came to us from the local ACC parish. Pending successful completion of his study and canonical examination, he is scheduled to be Ordained by Archbishop Reber as a Deacon in the UECNA on Sunday, September 12th.

On June 21st, we conducted our first Anglican Litany for Healing. This set of prayers and responses, the anointing of the sick with Holy Oil and a parting blessing was developed from several UECNA examples provided by Archbishop Reber. We plan to offer the Litany for Healing on the 3rd Sunday of every month immediately following the completion of the Holy Eucharist service.

News of the Clergy:

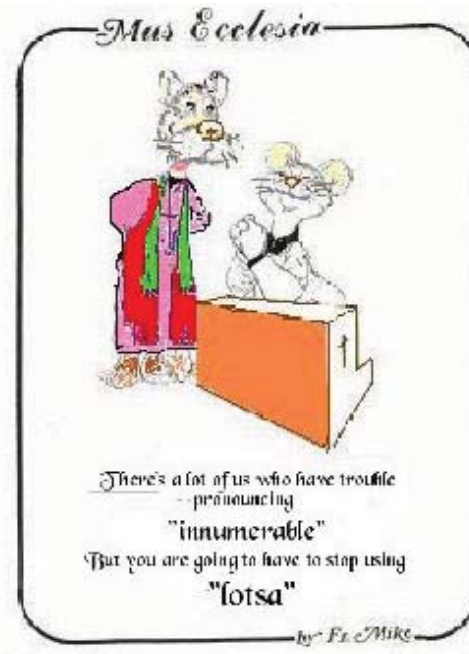
